

## CHAMPION Act a Threat to Core Public Health Funding

Congress is currently working to extend funding for several important health programs, including community health centers and the Children's Health Insurance Program. Unfortunately, the Community Health and Medical Professionals Improve Our Nation (CHAMPION) Act (H.R. 3922) would extend funding for community health centers by cutting the Prevention and Public Health Fund (Prevention Fund) by \$10.5 billion. The Prevention Fund supports grants from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to every state, the District of Columbia, the territories, and nonprofit and tribal organizations throughout the United States. These investments support vaccination programs, infectious disease detection and prevention, and chronic disease prevention. Trust for America's Health analyzed how much funding each state would lose under this legislation (based on the amount received in FY16). We cannot afford to eliminate our investment in chronic and infectious disease prevention and emergency preparedness. The important health programs included in the CHAMPION Act should be extended, but not at the expense of other vital public health investments.
